

present in bread and wine, and present in your people, who are gathered in spirit.
In this moment I join with them to receive you in my heart, and in our community.
May you, enthroned on the altar, be now enthroned in my heart; may you, present in bread and wine, feed and renew my soul; may you, who gives yourself to us again, fill us with grace, and heavenly blessing.
Even as I am fed, may my hunger for you and for your reign of justice and peace increase, that I may, with your Spirit, work for that day when your kingdom shall come on earth as it is heaven. Amen.

## Come Lord Jesus

and make in my heart your dwelling place and home.

I seek to love you with all my heart, mind, soul and strength, and so, through your presence in bread and wine

I receive you afresh and praise you for you are my God.

As you fill me, so may my love for you and for all your people, rise and overflow, that with joy and thanksgiving,

I may serve you in the world you love. Amen.
